World War One started in 1914 and ended in 1919.

- Soldiers signed up for war and some of the men had to lie about their age.
- The soldiers lived on the battlefield in trenches which were terrible places to stay.
- Lots of soldiers became very sick from staying in the trenches for too long.
- There were many battles during WWI and lots of soldiers died.
- Poppies grew on the battle fields after the war had ended and we still wear the poppy today to remember the soldiers who died.
- The end of World War One is remembered every year on November 11th. This is called Armistice Day or Remembrance day.
