

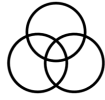

Llandudno

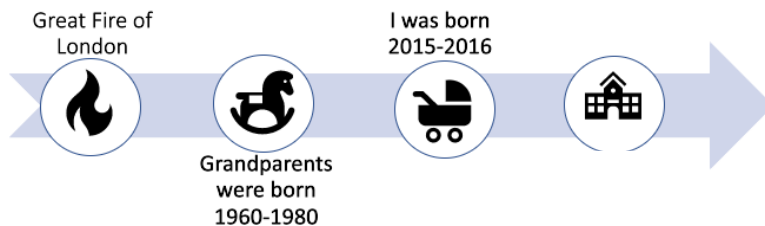
The town of Llandudno developed from Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age settlements over many hundreds of years on the slopes of the limestone headland. Llandudno is the largest seaside resort in Wales, and as early as 1861 was being called 'the Queen of the Welsh Watering Places.'

Queen Victoria	Queen Victoria was queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland from 1837 to 1901
Reign	Rule as monarch
Bathing machine	a wheeled hut drawn to the edge of the sea, used for changing in and bathing from.
Punch and Judy	an English puppet show on the mini stage.
Victorian	a person who lived during the Victorian period
Pier	a platform from the shore into the sea, usually has entertainment arcades and places to eat.
Promenade	a public walk along the sea-front at a seaside resort
