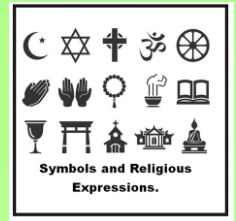

- Know Eid ul Fitr is a festival Muslims celebrate after fasting during the Islamic month called Ramadan.
- Know Muslims go to Mosque to join in congregational worship during Ramadan and Eid.
- Know that Ramadan is similar to lent in Christianity. However during Ramadan Muslims fast from sunrise until sunset and during lent Christians give up some of their favourite foods for 40 days.
- Know congregational worship in Islam is different to worship in Christianity, Muslims worship on prayer mat and prostrate whereas Christians worship sitting on pews.

Key vocabulary

Ramadan	Holy month of Islamic calendar, where Muslims, fast, pray and reflect.
Eid ul Fitr	Muslims celebrate Eid ul Fitr after 30 days of fasting and give charity to the poor.
congregation	A group of people assembled for religious worship.
saum	Fasting—one of the pillars of Islam.
revelation	An act of revealing or making known. (Allah revealed the Quran during the month of Ramadan)
sujud	Sujūd is the act of low bowing or prostration to Allah (God) facing the (Kaba) (House of God)
