




Year 5- Religious Education— Summer Term Religion—Hinduism

| kumkum | Red powder used for making the distinctive Hindu mark on the forehead |
| murtis | A devotional image such as a statue, or "idol" |
| puja tray | A tray. The items include a bell, a pot of water, a diva lamp, an incense burner, a pot of kum kum powder |
| aarti lamp | Lit divas that are placed before deities during prayer in temples and then used to bless worshippers |
